
Early release causes change in schedule

"I'm excited about getting settled into the Spartan family Hensley






and helping students achieve lifetime success,' Rich said.




students; there are hundreds more bodies in fact.

Our school is very hot this year. Not only is it hot outside but it is even hotter in our school! Students walking into classrooms are constantly complaining about how hot it is


When having over 30 students, the classrooms get hot! The temperature in the school varies. We as students feel that the office and counseling office are the only places in the school that is actually air conditioned.



Ready to be a new state?



TCAP successes

One of Greeley West's biggest objectives is to increase the TCAP scores. Last year, Greeley West increased tremendously in math, as well as reading and writing.

In math, the 9th grade students went from 40% proficient to 58%. In 10th grade, scores went from 45% to 63%.

In total, Greeley West went from 43% to 61% in math, which is an 18% increase. Writing went from 41% to 52%, and reading went from 44% to 53%.

The scores are still a little lower than the faculty would like, but they exceed the state average, which is very beneficial for Greelev

TCAP has been a huge part of the school and will continue to be in the years to come.

TCAP success came after sweeping changes to the administration of the test last year. In addition to teachers working hard and students taking the test seriously, scores led all public schools in Greeley.


