responsibility and excessively overwhelming.

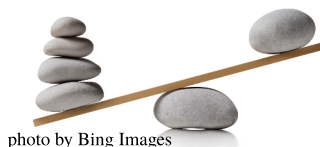

# VON MILLER TAKES A PAY CUT

Every year, free agency continues to be a big deal in football. In order to effectively acquire free agents, the Broncos need to free up "cap" room so they can sign new players. The salary cap is how much money you have to spend on players' contracts. The Broncos started the season with \$10 million in cap left from last year and trading Aqib Talib freed about \$11 million in cap, ultimately creating \$21 million in cap space. 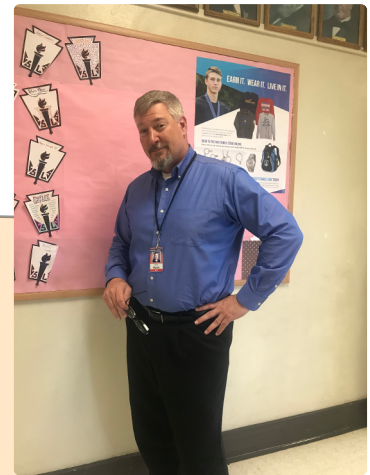
# STAFF MEMBER OF THE WEEK : Mr. Burch
