For the past 20 sum odd years, the region of Afghanistan has been the center of unparalleled political unrest. Since the attacks on September 11th, 2001, the United States has had a vice-like grip on Afghanistan, working tirelessly to push back and defeat the Taliban. Over the long and strenuous campaign, the U.S slowly dwindled the Taliban's forces to almost nothing, gaining control over the country and opening up freedoms to women, Christians, and people in the LGBTQI+ community. American lives for what was beginning to be a useless campaign. This eventually accumulated in president Donald J. Trump formulating a deal with the Taliban allowing for a formal withdrawal from the country, which was heavily conditional. The set date for the full withdrawal to be completed was May 2021, between this time period the country saw a transition from Donald Trump to Joe Biden as President of the United States.

When this date approached for the Biden administration Biden announced that the U.S troops would withdraw unconditionally, thus scrapping Donald Trump's withdrawal plan. Upon this announcement, Taliban forces launched an offensive quickly advancing ahead of a disjointed and collapsing Afghan military. Throughout the summer, the Taliban quickly pushed through Afghanistan with little to no resistance, region after region fell but the United States was still not confident a complete collapse was inevitable. This was until the Taliban invaded the capital city of Kabul which also fell with little to no resistance, the same day the president of Afghanistan, Ashraf Ghani, fled the country. Now that the country is being controlled by the Taliban, the freedoms unlocked under U.S. occupation have been all but revoked. Women are no longer allowed to attend school as it is against the Taliban law. People in the LGBTQI+ community are in imminent danger as the sentence if they are discovered is death. Amongst the other atrocities, ethnic cleansing is expected to begin and Christians are actively being hunted down and persecuted. Because of this,



AP Students Receive Less Credits for Presumably Harder Classes

AP credits have become a confusing issue since the chains of the COVID-19 pandemic impacted student's "reality"

While it is arguable whether AP classes are more difficult than base classes, it is generally accepted that AP classes involve a larger workload and more strenuous assignments. Then why would AP students during the Spring 2021 semester receive less credits than students who didn't take AP classes? During the 2020 school year, semesters changed to quarters and people would receive more credits for taking additional classes. However, students who took AP classes during the third quarter would end up receiving less credits than students who didn't. The reasoning behind this was that AP classes were rushed during the first two quarters and the classes needed to be extended semester long. This proceeded to take up the additional two classes that students were supposed to take during the third quarter. Students such as Freli Ndayishimiye, a senior and non-AP student, stated that he had 21 credits

at the beginning of senior year while Amber Hudgins, a senior and AP student, only had 18.5 credits. This is being compared to the 19-20 credit average that most seniors have as of the start of their senior year. Amber was not given the opportunity to receive as many credits as the other students in her grade were, even though she has been an all AP student and has focused on "higher level" classes throughout her high school career. Seeing as the school administration let students vote on how school would be done last year, there should have been more thought put into how the students would feel and how the credit situation would work. Staff members and faculty may argue that this issue isn't relevant considering students received 4 credits the first semester and 3 the second semester, which overall made up the 7 credits which students make during a semester based school year. However, this is based around the fact that students took 8 classes the first semester and didn't take off blocks.

Students who took 4 AP classes and took no off blocks would have also received only 6 credits during the whole school year. While this may not be a problem that all AP students share (or even consider), it is still an issue which must be addressed in order for students to be given the credit they deserve. A possible solution to this problem was suggested by Mrs. Martinez, when she said that counselors could possibly replace the absent credits that AP students had with elective credits, which seniors are known to be lacking. Students who took AP classes did the same amount of work for less credits, and deserve to receive the credits they earned.

California Fires Blow Smoke Into Western States Chloe Forsyth

Denver's air quality has again been ranked among the worst in the world.

The lack of rainfall in the California summer caused atrocious wildfires Nevada the Sierra mountains, but California isn't the only state affected by these wildfires. Western states such as Colorado, Wyoming, Nevada, etc. have been affected as well. California's fires have blown smoke into the states, causing western very poor air quality and hazy skies. The smoggy air especially can affect unhealthy groups, but even the CDPHE has warned that the air quality can impact healthy adults. recommended to wear a mask to protect yourself from breathing in murky air. The Denver News encourages citizens reschedule outside activities such as hiking, bike rides, and attending outdoor events in Colorado.

Coloradans, and even tourists from nearby states, have enjoyed taking trips to the Rocky Mountains to see Colorado's national parks such as the Great Sand Dunes, Garden of the Gods, or Maroon Bells, and to see beautiful mountain views, but these parks aren't what they used to be.

The hazy skies and air has littered itself in mountains, including national parks. The EPA, **Environmental Protection** Agency, requires every state to ensure a plan that will convey natural visibility which will be up to 200 miles on a clear day in the Rocky Mountains by 2064. The Colorado state air pollution control officials missed the deadline to submit a regional haze reduction plan to the EPA. The Colorado Department Public Health Environment officials had a meeting where proposed a future pollution plan. The officials plan is to cut 3,986 tons per year, by 2028.

But why are the western states so prone to wildfires? Why have there been so many wildfires in the U.S. recently? frequent The droughts, invasive grasses, and the suppression natural wildfires. has caused outbreaks wildfires. Climate change can even be considered as variable another in wildfires. The lack of rainfall in the western state's summers allows everything to act kindling, especially the invasive grasses. In the 1980s-90's, small wildfires in the mountains were quickly subdued, Makes sense right?
