Growing up locally, Gilbreath works with young athletes in Colorado to provide them with the resources they need to enhance their skills. In addition to owning his own baseball facility working with young athletes in Colorado, Gilbreath also makes visits to local schools to help the local youth to develop an interest in baseball. Gilbreath even coled a baseball clinic with teammate Kyle Freeland this year for the special olympics, allowing everyone to enjoy the sport. "My biggest goal is to try and give these kids every tool possible to help them get to the position I did," Gilbreath said.

When trying to achieve your goals, such as becoming a Major League pitcher, life inevitably throws you curveballs, but Gilbreath is often reminded that you have to keep pushing yourself to do the best you can. "You have to have a short memory, and I kind of take that into my own life, because no matter what hap-



pens, if I pitch poorly and I blow two games in a row, I still might have to come in that next game and give us a chance to win," Gilbreath explains and adds, "Even if you mess up two times and mess up two opportunities don't let that affect the third opportunity you get, because you never know if that's the one that is going to help you."

achieving his goals and what kind of lessons he carries on his back, Gilbreath explained, "I think baseball is kind of a good metaphor for life sometimes because it's one of the few games where really really good players fail more than half the time. Have you ever wondered what the first Halloween costume was? When was it made? In the 6th century BCE, a theatrical costume was an innovation of the Greek poet Thespis. Made of gauze masks and buckram, they were sprayed with starch and steamed over a mold.

Halloween Costumes are based on frightening supernatural or folkloric beings. In the 1930s, costumes based on characters in mass media such as film, literature, and radio were popular. They also tended to be worn mainly by young people, but since the mid-20th century, they have also been increasingly worn by adults. Some costumes may have been retained in the Christian observations on the Halloween region (Samhain). In the 16th century, the Celtic festival included humming, mumming, and guising. People would go house to house in costumes and usually receive songs/verses for food exchange. People would also impersonate the souls of the dead and receive offerings on their behalf. It was suggested that people that wore masks or costumes were to represent the spirits. The faces were marked (or blackened) with ashes taken from the bonfire. In the 19th century in Scotland, younglings went from house to house with masked, painted, or blackened faces. They were often threatened to make mischief if they were not

Wearing Costumes developed a custom of souling, which Christians praised in parts of Western Europe from the 15th century. Groups of people would go door to door, and they would collect soul cakes, and the cakes were representatives of the dead, also in return for saying prayers for them.

Costumes have elevated drastically over the last century and costumes are mostly monsters, colorful creatures, and frightful beings. Halloween can be traced back to the ancient Celtic festival known as Samhain, which is held on the first of November. It is believed that on that day, the souls of the dead returned to their homes, so people would dress up in their costumes and light bonfires just to ward off spirits.

Halloween began in North America in 1911, where children were seen "guising" around neighborhoods. Costumes were made at home or using items such as face paint or makeup. Halloween spending in 2022 has reached \$10.6 billion in revenue.



Millions of K-12 students missed school due to Hurricane Ian, the second-deadliest storm to hit the United States. One hundred deaths and the destruction of homes, businesses, and schools. Nearly every public school district in the state closed its buildings during the onslaught of Hurricane Ian. At least 55 of Florida's 67 public school districts closed for at least one day, according to the state's department of education, district websites, and social media. The districts that remained open were mainly in the state's panhandle. That amounts to more than 2.5 million students out of school, based on the most recently available federal data on public school enrollment. Around 1.7 million of those students missed three days or more, and several districts have yet to announce their reopening plans. The school districts in Florida have reopened, but many families have been displaced due to the destruction of their homes. Schools have also started re-building efforts, but schools in Sarasota, Florida still have had to remain closed due to safety concerns. Students have had much turmoil in the past years due to missing school related to COVID-19 and other traumatic events. The impact on the education of students will be felt for many years to come.

Apple continues to be on the forefront of design and technology and the products are always high-quality and worth the money.






### GCHS Student Spotlight: Andrea Espino Loma by Marcayla Clitso
