Making the Move: Activities for the rest of year

- ★ November 1, 2022: Open Enrollment window opens
- ★ November 3, 2022: CTE Expo @ AIMS Welcome Center 5-7pm.
- ★ December 15, 2022: Open Enrollment ends. All applications submitted after this date are automatically wait listed.
- ★ February 2023:
 - Open Enrollment lotteries run and offers sent via email and text message.
 - Begin ICAP: Explore how interests and careers relate.
 - High Schools come to Chappelow for registration.
 - Specialized Programs begin accepting applications.
 - February 28: Parent deadline to accept offers
- ★ Early March 2023: Attend registration open house at your high school

Boundary School or Open Enrollment

Boundary School Attendance

- ★ Determined by the primary address assigned in Infinite Campus. Will have to provide proof of residence.
- ★ May provide access to desired programs without a need for open enrollment.
- ★ Good option for students who do not yet have a desired path that would be well supported by programs at another high school.
- ★ Transportation possibly provided depending on distance from school.
- ★ Cannot be waitlisted or denied entry.

Open Enrolled School Attendance

- ★ Determined by an application submitted to attend a school outside of primary address boundaries. (Inside of application window and outside of application window)
- ★ An avenue to opportunities provided at one school, but not another.
- ★ Seat is yours until you change your mind or a transition point occurs.
- ★ Transportation not provided.
- ★ Could be waitlisted or denied entry.

Choosing the Right High School

- ★ Follow the path that meets your goals
 - Can be specific or general
 - What do you want to do?
 - Where are those options offered?
 - You might (and probably will) change your mind

Graduation Requirements

To receive a high school diploma, students must meet or exceed the district's academic standards by demonstrating college and career readiness on one or more of the following measures in English and Math. This is in addition to the credit requirement.*

Credit for High School Courses taken in Middle School

Students must:

- ★ Receive a “C” or better in the class
- ★ Successfully complete both semesters of the class
- ★ Take the course through their middle school or a Greeley-Evans District 6 high school*
- ★ Meet with Mrs. Fay to discuss courses taken and credit being considered
- ★ Meet with high school counselor to transcribe credit

*Courses taken summer between 8th and 9th grade are eligible for credit

Individual Career & Academic Plan

WHAT IS THIS ICAP?

An Individual Career & Academic Plan (ICAP)

- ★ Required for all students grades 6-12 in Colorado schools
- ★ Helps create a plan for high school & beyond
- ★ Based on individual skills, abilities, and interests

Individual Career & Academic Plan

HOW DO I CREATE MY ICAP?

- ★ Accessible any time you want
- ★ Your counselors and teachers in high school will help complete it

Individual Career & Academic Plan

WHY DO I NEED TO CREATE AN ICAP?

- ★ Helps you plan for your future
- ★ Helps us help you plan for your future
- ★ Helps parents know you're making a plan
- ★ Required by state mandate

Next Steps

STEP 1: Check your address in Infinite Campus. If a two-household family, check both and who is listed as primary. That is how boundary school is decided. Update with front office if needed. Proof of residency will be required.

STEP 2: Have a conversation as a family. It's important to know the following:

- ★ What are your child's goals for their future?
- ★ What are their special passions, interests, and abilities
- ★ What special circumstances exist in your family that may impact this
- ★ life change?

STEP 3: After you discuss as a family, compare the answers to the programs we discussed tonight. This presentation will be posted to the counseling website for your review. If your child's goals can be achieved at their boundary high school, there is nothing to do right now.

Next Steps

STEP 4: If you even remotely suspect your child's goals would best be met by their attending a high school that is **NOT** your boundary high school, **submit an application for Open Enrollment** sometime between November 1 and December 15. It is far better to decline an offer you decide you don't need that end up on a waitlist you may never come off. Link available on Chappelow's Counseling tab.

★ Offers sent out first week in February and must be accepted by February 28, 2023.

STEP 5: **Start looking at admissions requirements** of schools your child is interested in if a 4-year college/university is in their future so you may begin to plan for high school.
