

GREELEY CENTRAL TAKES ON POST-APOCALYPTIC ROMEO & JULIET C. Burzell & M. Dreiling

Greeley Central's Thespian Troupe, 657, came out swinging this year with their performance of the Shakespeare classic, *Romeo and Juliet*. The Arts Magnet strives to put all of their effort into every production that is performed here. Romeo and Juliet was no exception. While the odd twist of a post-apocalyptic setting may have lent itself most strongly to costume and set design, it still made for an interesting take on this classic. Each outfit was carefully curated and helped place the historic drama into a dystopian future. The performers wore clothes that were dirty and ripped to represent the post-apocalyptic feel throughout the entire show. They added striking black temporary tattoos around their necks, down their arms and across their faces. The stage was set with industrial junk yard detritus, the graffiti-blazoned car reinforcing the sense of a dark not so distant future.

Excellent performances came from many of our amazing actors, including Brian Davis (Romeo), Greta Krombholz (Juliet), Irene Gabriel (Nurse), and Lindy Muttel (Mercutio), and all of the cast put their emotions into their performance and it proved extremely beneficial for them. When male lead of the play, Brian Davis, was asked why he loves acting, he replied, "I started acting because I wanted to be able to make people laugh, but now, as I have developed more as a person, I've found that my joy in acting comes from being able to step into the shoes of others, and to generate emotions in both myself and the audience." This production also did away traditional gender roles, switching up key characters Mercutio and Tybalt by casting them as women. Muttel in particular relished her role with swagger, dominating the stage with dramatic leaps across the stage, often landing on the car. The club saved GCHS \$315 dollars in the eight hours we attended school just by conserving some energy. Here at the Castle, the popular method of lighting is fluorescent bulbs, they're cheap, easy to install, and they save about 75% more energy than the incandescent alternative. A WIN FOR DISTRICT 6: 3A PASSING

`It has been a long and emotional fight for District 6 and Greeley-Evans civilians. After past failed attempts in 2009 and 2016, the ballot issue 3A has finally passed, 59.21 to 40.79 and people are rejoicing since it will result in more funding for the school district. This year, 2017, the 3A campaign ran a more aggressive, hands on, approach to the public with thought out tactics making citizen oversight committees to guarantee residents that the MLO (Mill Levy Override) money would be spent productively. Property taxes in District 6 will increase \$14 million, or 10 mills for the next seven years. The district has promised that the money that they are gaining will go toward security within public schools and supporting educational programs that will buy new technology which will help blend the learning program. It will also put the money towards new academic textbooks in classrooms and paying the teachers and staff a higher wage. The budget cuts that affected many by making high school students use the public buses will be reversed, the school bus routes and transportation will be improved and reinstated. The charter schools within Greeley-Evans area, Frontier Academy, Union Colony, University, West Ridge Academy and Salida del Sol Academy, will also be gaining a piece depending on the enrollments they have. District 6 is the largest district within the state and the only one in Weld County that does not have an MLO. MLO's are the only additional way for public schools in Colorado to earn more money outside of the state set limits. After a long journey, the district officials and their campaign crew can rest, celebrating their win.

JFK FILES DROP
