Everything you need to know about the fires and how to help By Sean Rotter

The Boulder Country fires are, without doubt, one of the most devastating natural disasters in Colorado history, destroying 1,084 homes and forcing 35,000 to evacuate in Superior and Louisville, within just a couple of days. This unprecedented inferno began December 30th, 2021, and within hours the flame engulfed hundreds of acres, being fueled by 100 mile per hour winds. This culminated in an unstoppable wall of destruction moving the length of a football field (100 yards) every 3 seconds. The terror which ensued saw thousands of families fleeing the disaster, attempting to save whatever valuables they could with only minutes to decide. In the aftermath, aid centers and shelters filled up along the front range as people desperately looked for a place to lay their heads amid the destruction. To help with the clean up, the state and the federal governments have enacted large aid packages and extended a helping hand to those suffering amid this unheard-of disaster.

President Joe Biden visited the burn area on January 8th, and after examining the destruction promised federal help to all those affected. Despite swift action by the governments, there is still a mountain of work to do to help out those impacted by this disaster. But the government is not the only party responsible for giving aid to victims, we as a community have a duty to help our fellow citizens in times of distress. Laurie Ford's Celebration of life ceremony

Laurie Ford, at age 56, died on December 12th, 2021, approaching her fifth year of being diagnosed with cancer

On January 8th, former staff at Greeley Central, Laurie Ford's celebration was held in the Greeley Central gym. Ford told her son, Kortne, that she didn't want a traditional funeral, but to have a celebration of life. Everyone who knew or was impacted by Ford was invited to the celebration. Ford was a former math teacher at Greeley Central and had taught for 11 years here. Kortne, a former GCHS student, describes that Ford's goal in her life was to positively impact the kids around her. She was always positive about her condition and never complained about it.

Around five years ago, Ford was diagnosed with breast cancer. In 2017, her cancer had metastasized to her bones, and her doctors gave her around three to six months to live. She quickly started chemotherapy, radiation, and natural treatments. She had to travel to Denver every day for some of her treatments, but with her effort, Ford lived far past the six months. Her cancer levels declined significantly, and she came very close to beating it, but it came back and she had to start all the treatments on a full-time schedule all over again. Ford never complained though. Her son, Kortne, states that she never dwelled on the negative things in her life. She was always positive and grateful for everything. Kortne believes that's why she was able to live so long. Her celebration marked her impact on those in our community.

Chicago teachers strike over differences in dealing with COVID-19 in schools

The leaders of Chicago's school district want to return to in person learning, but teachers are afraid to for their sake as well as their students' safety.

Teachers all over Chicago in a few districts have been on strike and/or protesting the return to in-person learning that many of the school leaders are pushing for. Many teachers feel that it isn't safe for the students and themselves to return after seeing a huge spike in COVID-19 cases after returning from winter break. The strike took place in five out of the first seven days of the semester, due in part to not seeing a decrease in cases. Many leaders tried countering the strike with statements about students, and how going online suddenly would be "detrimental" to students. "Students need to be back in person as soon as possible. That's what the science supports. We will not relent." This could mean they are worried for the students physical, and more importantly, mental health in all of this. Teachers are worried about that as well, but they are afraid for their own health, even if roughly 90% of the staff is vaccinated and following mask mandates. Due to the high vaccination rate and mask mandates, the decision of teachers to strike is controversial. Throughout all of this the strike did finally end on January 10th, with students returning to in person learning on the 12th.



16th Street Fire

Around 11:45 am the morning of January 26, a large cloud of dark smoke could be seen clearly in the sky from a few miles away. Many students on their lunch break were commenting on the visible cloud of smoke coming from the east. A garage and tire shop on the corner of 16th Street and 3rd Avenue was engulfed in flames. The cause of the fire was revealed to be an open gas valve that caught fire and set two buildings ablaze - the auto shop and the neighboring storage building.

Police had blocked off 16th and were redirecting traffic around it, which extended late into the night, causing major traffic disruptions. The Greeley Fire Department worked hard throughout the day to control the blaze, although flames and smoke were still visible late into the afternoon.

No one was harmed during the incident, thankfully, but the damage was significant, leaving the buildings in complete ruin and piles of ash.


Snow days during COVID
